#### **Student Services Department Updates**

Another year is almost completed! We want to wish all our students a safe and happy summer break. Some important information to keep in mind as you move through the summer holidays.

Incoming grade 9 students are invited to the Get Ready! For High School program taking place on August 27th. Parents are reminded to check their emails and confirm attendance.

Student schedules for the 2024-2025 school year were given out to students on June 13th during Period 1. Students with Period 1 spares are asked to pick up their timetables from Student Services. Students wishing to make course changes are asked to pick up a pink course change form from Student Services and submit it completed with their request. They must also make an appointment with their Guidance Counsellor using the QR code or the form on Google classroom. Please be aware that we may not be able to accommodate all course change requests, but we will do our best to try to accommodate students. Course changes will be addressed during the last week in August before school begins.

The Summer School registration deadline for DPCDSB was June5. They are now only accepting late applications if there is room in the course being requested. Online Registration forms is still available on Google classroom however will place students on a waitlist at this point. All other summer school registrations have been confirmed and students have been notified.



## ACADEMIC RESOURCE DEPARTMENT

A few reminders before we head into the summer break:


